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CLINIC SPEAKERS



JERRY WEINSTIEN is a graduate of UCLA where he played for ABCA Hall of Fame coach Art Reichle. He received his BA, MS and teaching credential at UCLA where he also spent 2 years coaching the freshman team.

After a year at Pioneer HS in Whittier, 3 years at Santa Monica HS, and 3 years at LA Valley College, Jerry spent 23 years at Sacramento City College. There he compiled an 831-208 (.800) with 16 championships & 2 co-championships, 2 State Titles (7 time runner up), and a National Championship in 1998. Sac City was voted the

Community College program for the decade of the 90's by Collegiate Baseball

Newspaper. While at Sac City Jerry's Panthers produced 28 Major League players and had 213 players drafted. Jerry was an assistant to Ron Fraser at the University of Miami in 1984 where they finished 4th in Omaha. He spent 5 years as an assistant at Cal Ploy San Luis Obispo with Larry Lee.

Jerry has been active in International baseball as head coach of the USA representative in the 1970 University Games, assistant coach of the USA team in the 1989 Pan Am Games, the 1992 Olympic Team, the 1996 Olympic Team (Bronze Medal), and head coach of the 2004 USA Maccabiah Team (Gold Medal). He has spoken at clinics in Italy, Amsterdam, Rotterdam, and Germany.

In professional baseball Jerry has been the Brewers catching coordinator, managed for the Expos, Cubs, and for the Rockies in the California League. He also was catching coordinator for the Dodgers and later Director of Player Development for the Dodgers. Jerry is currently the Major League catching coach for the Rockies.

Jerry is a member of the California Community College Baseball Hall of Fame, the Sacramento City College Athletic Hall of Fame, the ABCA Hall of Fame and the La Salle Club Coaches Hall of Fame.

Jerry has written numerous articles, 3 books & chapters for 2 others, plus he has produced various instructional videos.



PAUL REDDICK helps pitchers throw harder. Because of the results of the pitchers that use his many books, courses and instruction Paul is known as the Master of MPH. Paul

has served as a scout for Pittsburgh Pirates, a state delegate for USA Baseball and coached in the Montreal Expo farm system.

His signature velocity getting course The gomph Club is used by more pitchers than any other single pitching training program.

Paul is currently the Director of The Yogi Berra Museum baseball camp and the Co-Author of the best seller The Picture Perfect Pitcher with Tom House and Mike Epstein on Hitting with Mike Epstein.

Paul is also one of America's top young speakers. He speaks to numerous youth, high school, college, and business groups every year. Paul's speaking career is centered around empowering youth and college groups to achieve lasting success, greater friendships, and healthy relationships.



MARK UYL has been the MHSAA Assistant Director since 2004. His responsibilities include administration of the MHSAA Baseball program.

Prior to joining the MHSAA staff, Mark was a high school teacher, coach and athletic director at Caledonia HS and Thornapple Kellogg HS. For the past twenty years, he has been a Division I baseball umpire, currently working in the Big Ten and American Athletic conferences. He has umpired 10 Regionals, 5 Super Regionals and two College World Series (2014 and 2017) in Omaha. Mark was a four-year starter at first base at Calvin College (1992-96) earning all-conference honors on two occasions.



CRAIG RAINEY is entering his 25th season as the head baseball coach at Adrian College in 2018. Under Rainey's leadership, Adrian's baseball program has risen to national

prominence and has become a perennial contender for the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association championship.

In 2017, Adrian returned to the top of the MIAA pinnacle and received the conference's automatic bid to the NCAA Division III Baseball Championship by going 34-13 overall and 23-5 in the MIAA. A school-record three Bulldogs-Ian Mikol//Ski (First Team), Ryan Dorow (Third Team) and Tommy Parsons (Third Team)-were named to the D3baseball.com All-America team and Mikol//Ski and Parsons also landed on the American Baseball Coaches Association All-America second- and third-teams, respectively. Mikowski (.580 on-base percentage) and Parsons (12 victories and a 14.43 strikeout-to-walk ratio) also won NCAA statistical titles.

The 2016 Bulldogs wound up 30-12 overall and 24-4 in conference play--winning the league by six games. Adrian swept the individual player awards as All-American Dorow earned the MIAA Position Player of the Year for the second time in three years and Parsons was named the Pitcher of the Year as a sophomore. Led by all-region standouts Mikowski, Dorow and Parsons, Adrian set school records with a NCAA Division III-topping .438 on-base percentage, 228 walks and 366 runs scored among other team/individual benchmarks.



SCOTT THEISEN has been coaching for 27 years and has coached at East Lansing High School and Walled Lake Central High School in addition to Saline. He graduated high school at

Saline in 1983 where he played both football and baseball, and attended Michigan State University. His hobbies are fishing and hunting, and his favorite part of coaching is the relationships developed between coaches and players.

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PERRY HILL returns as Miami's first base/infield coach for 2017, his fifth consecutive season in position and 10th overall with Marlins. This season will mark 22nd as a Major

League coach and 31st in professional baseball. Last season, Miami registered its fifth-best fielding percentage ever, at .985, committing just 86 errors, the third-lowest total ever behind 2015 (77) and 2003 (76). Their fielding percentage ranked fourth in NL, and they committed the fourth-fewest errors, behind only San Francisco (72), Washington (73), and the Dodgers (80).

From May 29-June 30, Marlins infielders went 28 consecutive games without committing an error. According to STATS LLC, was longest such streak since at least 1913, ahead of a 25-game run by Baltimore from May 22-June 15 of 2015, and 24-game stretches by Seattle (2012), San Francisco (2010), and Philadelphia (2004). In 2015, Miami set single-season fielding records in fewest errors committed (77) and fielding percentage (.987). Oversaw Dee Gordon's transition to second base, who netted first career Rawlings Gold Glove award after posting highest fielding percentage (.992) by Marlins' second baseman in Club history. Marlins seven highest single-season fielding percentages have been under Hill's direction, including last season's franchise-best .987 mark; also had .987 percentage in 2003, followed by .986 in 2013, .986 in 2004, .985 in 2011, .984 in 2014 and .983 in 2005. Prior to 2013, previous appearance as a Major League coach was with Florida in 2011, when Marlins recorded then third-best fielding percentage (.985) in Franchise history. Under Hill's guidance in 2009, Pittsburgh Pirates led all Major League teams in fielding percentage (.988) and made fewest errors (73) among all teams, setting Club records for most errorless games played in one season (101) and also with their fielding percentage (.988). Bucs lost 99 games in 2009 and made a Major League-low 73 errors, the most losses ever by a team that led the Majors in fewest errors in a season. Pirates also led National League in double plays turned (171) for third-straight season. By 2006, Hill instructed Rawlings Gold Glove

Award winners at all four infield positions over course of career: 1B Derrek Lee (2003), 2B Luis Castillo (2003-05), 3B Mike Lowell (2005) and SS Orlando

Cabrera (2001). Instructed infield that included All-Stars Miguel Cabrera and Dan Uggla, as well as NL Rookie of the Year Hanley Ramirez. Led Marlins to then third-best fielding percentage (.983, tied) in Club history in 2005. Guided third baseman Mike Lowell and second baseman Luis Castillo to winning Rawlings Gold Glove Awards, the seventh and eighth Gold Gloves in Club history. Led Club to .986 fielding percentage in 2004, second-best mark in Franchise history. Assisted second baseman Luis Castillo in collecting second-straight Rawlings Gold Glove Award. In addition, third baseman Mike Lowell committed just seven errors in 154 games, a Major League record for third basemen. Because of Hill's efforts, was named a 2004 All-Star Game coach. Guided Marlins to Franchise-best .987 fielding percentage in 2003, ranking third in Majors, behind Seattle (.989) and St. Louis (.987). Saw Florida's starting infield post a .987 fielding percentage (40 E/3,124 TC). Guided first baseman Derrek Lee and second baseman Luis Castillo, who collected Rawlings Gold Glove Awards in 2003, to Florida's fourth and fifth Gold Glove Awards in Franchise history and first not won by catcher Charles Johnson. Experienced first ML postseason action in 2003, following three as a Minor league coach and t(AJO as a Minor league instructor, and guided Marlins to World Series Championship, including a .982 mark by the starters. Lowered Marlins' overall infield errors total by two, from 67 in 2001; Florida's infield had a .980 fielding mark in that season. Joined Marlins on February 12, 2002, following two years (2000-01) as Expos' first base and infield coach. Helped lower Expos' infield errors total for second straight season as they committed only 65 infield miscues in 2001 (3,422 TC, a .981 fielding percentage), down from 72 errors in 2000 and 88 in 1999. Guided development of shortstop Orlando Cabrera, who collected first Rawlings Gold Glove Award in 2001. Prior to joining Expos, served three seasons (1997-99) as Detroit Tigers' third base and infield coach. Under his tutelage in 1998, three of four Tigers' infielders finished among top four in AL at their positions in fielding percentage. Led 1997 Tigers to AL's top fielding mark; became first team ever to go from worst to first in fielding in consecutive seasons. Spent 13 years in Texas Rangers' organization prior to joining Detroit. Served most of 1995 and 1996 seasons as roving infield instructor and Coordinator of Minor league Instruction for Rangers. Spent the second half of the 1995 season as the Rangers' first base coach, filling in for Ed Napoleon. Joined the Rangers' Major league staff for part of 1992 season and all of 1993 and '94 as Club's first base and

infield coach. Named to position on July 16, 1992, when Toby Harrah was named manager. Worked six seasons (1987-92) as Rangers' Coordinator of Minor league Instruction and roving infield instructor and made coaching stints at Single-A Daytona Beach in 1985-86 and Single-A Tri Cities in 1984. Made t(NO trips to Japan following 1993 season to work with Chunichi Dragons of Japanese Central league. Worked with them in their January 1995 spring camp in Arizona.

Played six professional seasons, including each of final five years in Mexican Sonora League. Signed as shortstop by Rio Grande of Gulf States league on May 1, 1976, and played one season with Rio, batting .194 in 53 games. Spent 1977-81 in Mexican Sonora league before retiring as a player. Played in 622 games in Mexico, batting .257 with eight home runs and 228 RBI.

Perry Wendell Hill was inducted into Paris Junior College Hall of Fame in 2014, the Hurst/Euless/Bedford, Texas Hall of Fame (hometown school district) in February of 2002 and Clarinda, Iowa Hall of Fame in November of 2002. Attended University of Texas - Pan American in Edinburg, Texas, for two years, where he hit .351 and was the team captain in 1974. Spent two previous seasons at Paris Junior College (TX) and earned all-conference honors ooth years. Lettered three times in baseball at L.D. Bell High School in Hurst, Texas. In 2002, directed and produced a DVD entitled "Ultimate Infield," an instructional video on the fundamentals of fielding.



DAN WOLOCKO is the Director of Sports Therapy & Sports Performance. Dan has over 10 years of sports medicine experience in metro Detroit and specializes

in rehabilitation and conditioning of athletes of all ages. He received his Master's degree in Physical Therapy from Grand Valley State University and a Bachelor's Degree in Health Fitness in Preventative and Rehabilitative Programs from Central Michigan University. Dan is a licensed physical therapist, a certified strength and conditioning specialist (through the National Strength





TOM DONALD enters his 20th season as head baseball coach for Buchanan High School in Clovis, California. In his previous 19 seasons, Tom has led Buchanan to 466-

125-5 (.781) record.

His teams have won Valley Championships in 2005, 2006, 2010, 2011, 2015, and 2016. Buchanan was awarded the California Team of the Year in both 2011 and 2016, as well as being named USA Today National Champions.

In 2016 alone, Donald was awarded TRAC Coach of the Year (COY,) Clovis Round Up COY, Fresno Bee COY, Baseball Coaches Association Region 8 COY, Diamond Sports ABCA HS Division 1 Regional COY, and USA Today California Coach of the Year

Donald has had the privilege of coaching MLB players Justin Wilson, Jordan Luplow, Garrett Olson, and his son, Jason. In 2010, Jason broke up Detroit Tiger's Armando Galarraga's no-hitter, on the last out, as a member of the Cleveland Indians.

Donald boasts a staff of 8 assistants, with 7 of those assistants playing baseball professionally. The only assistant coach who did not play pro ball, happened to play at Fresno State. Donald believes in letting his coaches share their wealth of knowledge and deliver superior instruction.



ANDREW MAKI enters his third year with the Northern Illinois University Baseball program in 2017-18 where he is the pitching coach and recruiting coordinator for the Huskies. Maki came to

NIU from Eastern Michigan, where he spent the last six seasons with the Eagles as Associate Head Coach and Recruiting Coordinator. In his time at EMU, Maki served as both a hitting and pitching coach seeing success in both positions. In 2009 as the hitting coach, the Eagles finished the year with 100 home runs. That is the most in program history.

Seven different Eagles earned first team All-Mid-American Conference honors in Maki's time at Eastern Michigan, including All-Region selection Zack Leonard in 2011. That season, Leonard finished the year with a .372 batting average and became the all-time hit

leader in EMU history. The Eagles led the MAC in batting average (.300), on-base percentage (.385), runs (353), doubles (120) and runs per game (6.5) in 2011 on their way to a 37 win season. Lee Longo won the MAC batting title at .379 for the Eagles in 2014 under Maki's tutelage. In his two seasons as the Eagles pitching coach, the Eastern Michigan pitching staff averaged 357 strikeouts per season, including a program record 389 in 2012. That same season three different pitchers earned MAC West Pitcher of the Week honors. Eagle Steve Weber, who was twice decorated as pitcher of the week, was drafted by the Miami Marlins in 2012. Including Weber, Eastern Michigan had five players selected in the Major League Baseball draft in Maki's six years with the Eagles. Prior to his time in Ypsilanti, Maki coached three seasons at Wayne State University in Detroit, Michigan where he was the recruiting coordinator and hitting coach. In his final two seasons with the Warriors, 2007 and 2008, WSU posted on-base percentages of .414 and .397, respectively, while batting at least .300 both seasons, led by a .325 performance in 2007. Maki got his start in collegiate coaching in 2005 at Henry Ford Community College, where he was the Hawks pitching coach. In 2005, the staff posted an earned run average of 3.90 and posted a 15-win improvement from 2004. He is a graduate of Grand Valley State.



AARON WILSON

Michigan Director of Scouting. Wilson previously served as the Michigan assistant scouting director for three years before being named scouting director in August, 2016. A native of Detroit, Wilson is well-connected throughout Michigan with high school, summer and college coaches. After starring at Henry Ford HS in Detroit, where he earned 2006 Louisville Slugger All-America honors and set the MHSAA record for strikeouts and ERA, he went on to pitch at Coppin State University.
